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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Fires are integral to forests since ancient times as they have shaped their structure, composition and functions. More than 95% of Forest fires in India are man-made and pose enormous threats with colossal negative consequences on the survival of natural flora and fauna and subsequently human beings themselves.

Prevention and control of forest fire assumes an important aspect in management of forests. Forest fires are traditionally managed by State Forest Departments by involving the forest personnel, seasonal fire watchers and local communities. With increasing frequency and duration of forest fires, it becomes imperative to develop a comprehensive forest fire strategy so as to transform forest fire management of our Country's diverse forests - more resilient to the threats and impact of forest fires in the future.

As a part of this strategy, The National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA), Ministry of Home Affairs, Govt. of India, in collaboration with the Ministry of Environment, Forest & Climate Change (MoEF&CC), Govt. of India devised a specialised training programme to train the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) Battalions of the Country in Forest Fire Prevention and Mitigation Strategies and engage them for Forest Fire control measures in future. The Central Academy for State Forest Service (CASFOS), Coimbatore under the aegis of the MoEF&CC has been assigned the responsibility of conducting a specialized Two-Weeks training to NDRF 10th Battalion, Vijayawada to this effect from 6th – 18th February, 2023.

This training programwas customised over consultations with the NDRF to best suit the training needs of the battalion workforce in terms of imparting basic understanding of forest fire, science and management of forest fires, operational strategies, techniques, and use of tools, together with hands-on practice and field demonstrations and rounds of mock-drills (both day and night mock drills). During the first week, classroom-based lecture sessions coupled with field visits and demonstration sessionswere conducted in Coimbatore and Nilgiris Districts followed by a weeklong mock field drills at Tirunelveli District.

The training program was inaugurated thru a common program organized at CASFOS, Dehradun on hybrid mode in which Director-IGNFA, Director-Directorate of Forest Education, DG-NDRF, PCCF- Uttarakhand and Principal-CASFOS spoke on the importance of Forest Fire mitigation and the need for the training program. This was followed by a brief inaugural program at CASFOS Coimbatore presided over by Principal, CASFOS Coimbatore.

Fifty NDRF personnel from their 10th battalion, Vijayawada attended the training Program. The participants included Officers from various Ranks such as Two from Assistant Commandant, Six from Inspector, One from Assistant Sub-Inspector, Eight from Head Constable and Thirty-three from Constable ranks.

The topics covered during the first week of the training program i.e from 6-12 Feb, 2023 were Organization structure in Forest Department, Forest Fire Scenario in India, Understanding Forest Fire regime in different forest types of India, Influence of Weather on Forest Fire and Forest Fire behavior, Forest Types in India, Introduction to various modern fire-fighting tools & equipment, Forest Fire Management System in India: Current Scenario, FSI – Forest Fire Alert System, Utility of UAV / Drones in Forest Fire Management, Fire Hazard and safety measures, Forest Fire Danger rating and monitoring, Forest Fire and Jhum cultivation in North East and Case study of one major forest fire incident: Handling of a Forest Fire Crisis. It also included a field exercise at Mettuplayam Forest range on map reading and use of GPS for navigation inside the forests, Visits to Tropical deciduous forests and High altitude Coniferous forests at Mudumalai and Nilgiris, respectively. The Participants were given hands-on training on Forest Fire line creation works, Fire control methods with use of traditional brooms and modern equipment during the field visits.

The week-long field exercises from 13.2.23 to 18.2.23 included field visitto Kurangani Hill Forest, Theni Forest division where a major fire broke out during the year 2018. The trainees were apprised about the cause of the major forest fire, circumstances that led to loss of many human lives and important learnings from the incident during the visit. An interaction program with Villagers about involvement of communities in Forest Fire Control at Melamavadi Village, Map reading and Trekking exercise at Agalisas tha Beat to the forest area which was burnt during last

fire season and Creation of Fire Line (12 Mts& 6 Mts width) exercises, Forest Fire Fighting mock drill exercises (both day and night drills) at the Parandamalai Hillock, Tirunelveli District. The utility of Firelines, the direct attack& counter fire burning operations in restricting the spread of Forest Fire were imparted during the field exercises.

The Valedictory program was conducted at Valliyoor through hybrid mode. The Principal, CASFOS presided over the function at and it was co-presided by Eco-development Officer, KMTR. The Director-IGNFA and Director-Directorate of Forest Education participated from Dehradun through online mode.

The trainees were provided with a user-friendly "Field manual on Forest Fire Prevention and Mitigation Strategies" which was prepared based on the inputs provided during the training along with the Copies of presentation made by experts.


