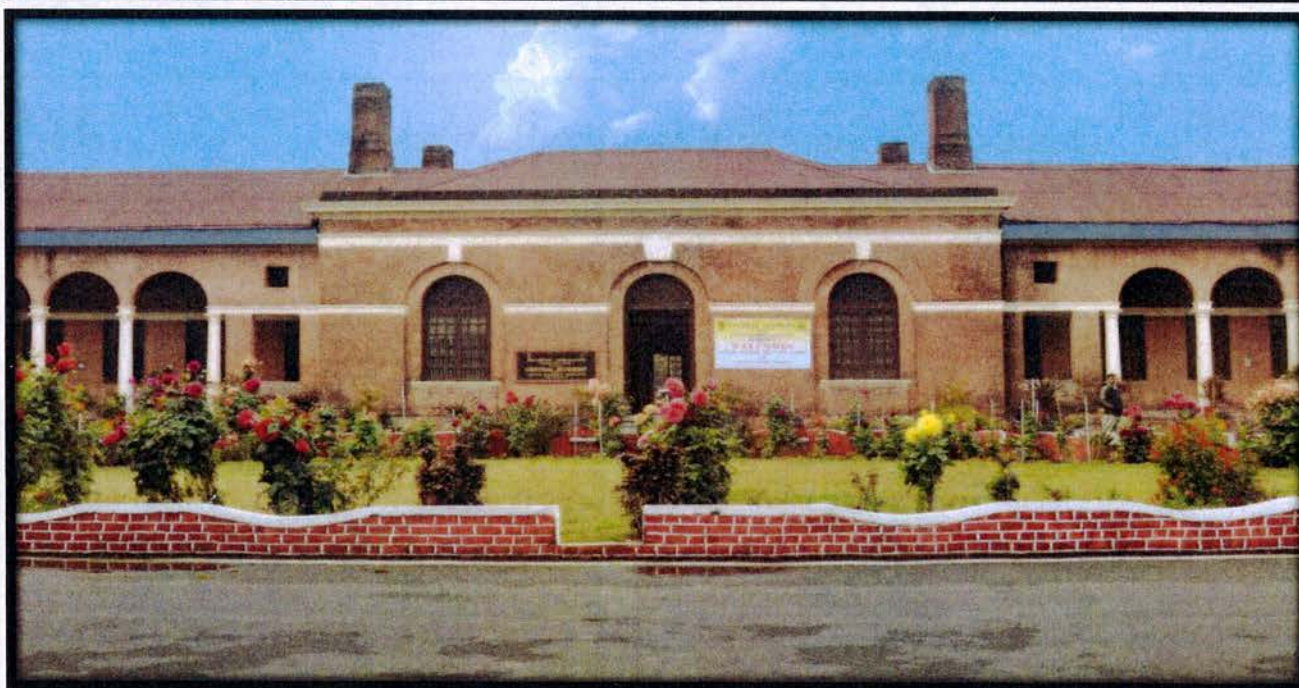

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Executive Summary

As a continuation of the series of special online courses on **Forestry Related Central Legislation** for Assistant Conservator of Forests and Range Forest Officers exclusively for the Union Territory of Jammu and Kashmir, post the J&K Reorganization Act, 2019, the second training course was organized from 14th to 19th September, 2020. A total of 40 participants including 3 lady officers participated in this training programme. The group consisted of 16 Assistant Conservator of Forests 24 Range Forest Officers and.

The deliberations began with the inauguration of the course on 14th September 2020 by Sh. S.K. Ratho, IFS, Additional Director General (FC) wherein Director Forest Education, Sh. R.P. Singh, IFS, and Sh. T. Rabi Kumar, IFS, Chief Conservator of Forests (Central) from Jammu & Kashmir were present as Guests of Honour. Sh. Ratho applauded the efforts of the Academy for calling the best resource persons and conducting online courses that have become a need of the hour, given the COVID-19 related restrictions and precautions in traveling and assembly. He exhorted the participants to take maximum benefit of this opportunity, where the eminent people could join the training programme from distant places despite their very busy schedule.

Shri R.P Singh, Director, Directorate of Forest Education, Dehradun deliberated upon the importance of this module for the officers of J&K in the light of the recent reorganization of the State of J&K to a newly formed Union Territory and reminded the participants of their fundamental duties towards the Constitution of India w.r.t environmental protection including forests and wildlife.

Shri Rabi Kumar, IFS, APCCF, J&K expressed his gratitude to the Academy for conducting the series of courses, the first one of which was highly appreciated by the participants. He hoped that this course would also be able to meet the expectations of the participants. He mentioned the need of generating UT specific case studies, to make the training program, more relevant to the officers. He stated the need to develop some Master Trainers from amongst the participants, who could further train the field staff of the Union Territory.

Shri Kunal Satyarthi, IFS, Principal, CASFOS, Dehradun, appreciated & congratulated the efforts of the authorities of J&K in restructuring the Indian Forest Act, 1927 which he

felt was progressive compared to other States. According to him, this course has been unique as it included a variety of experts like serving and retired senior forest officers, academicians, bureaucrats, and leading lawyers in the country and that this course has been quite successful in touching upon almost all the Acts related to Forestry and Wildlife.

The inaugural session was followed by a session on the Relevance of CrPC to Forest Officers by Smt. Sudhavijay Singh Bhadoria, Asst District Prosecution Officer, Madhya Pradesh; Relevance of Indian Penal Code & Indian Evidence Act to Forest Officers by Dr. C. Ramesh, IFS, Lecturer, CASFOS, Dehradun; two sessions on Indian Forest Act, 1927 by Shri Kunal Satyarthi, IFS, Principal, CASFOS Dehradun; Wildlife Crime Scenario and Investigation Under Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972 by Shri Ritesh Sarothiya, Special Task Force MP Forest Department; Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972 by Shri R.K. Singh, Legal Initiative for Forest & Development, New Delhi; Forest (Conservation) Act, 1980 by Shri Sandeep Sharma, AIG, MoEF&CC, New Delhi.; Judgements related to Forest & Environment by Shri Sanjay Upadhyay, Advocate, Supreme Court, New Delhi; National Green Tribunal Act, 2010: Court Orders by Shri Ritwick Dutta and Ms Kanika Sood, Advocates, New Delhi; Biological Diversity Act, 2002 by Shri Justin Mohan, IFS, Secretary, National Biodiversity Authority, Chennai; Forest Rights Act, 2006 by Ms. R. Jaya, Joint Secretary, Ministry of Tribal Affairs, New Delhi; Panchayat (Extension to Scheduled Areas) Act, 1996 by Shri A.K. Goyal, IFS (Retd.), New Delhi.

All the relevant reading material like bare Acts, Rules, and presentations etc. were provided to the participants about a week before commencing the training through Sharepoint, an online mode of sharing and accessing information. In addition, the hard copies of the bare Acts were sent to participants for reference purpose. This has enabled the participants to access the presentations even when intermittently the network connectivity was not very good. During the demo and pre-registration session held on 11th September, the participants were also briefed that given the limited time scheduled for each of the Acts, they should come prepared with the reading material, to make the best use of the time given.

All the sessions were highly appreciated by the participants, particularly the discussion sessions. However, a concern about the shortage of time for each of the Act was also raised and it was felt that at least half a day should have been allotted for each of the Act. This batch of attendees was particularly very interactive and most of the time, the discussion continued during the entire break time between the two sessions and even during lunch break.

Some of the participants requested for more such thematic courses on issues like:

- Prosecution Module
- Technological Interventions for Soil Moisture Conservation with special focus on Bio-Engineering
- Human Resource Management
- Stress Management
- Special issues in JK UT such as hurdles in implementation of IFA, Forest (Conservation) Act etc.

The Valedictory Programme was presided by the Chief Guest Shri Sarvesh Rai, IFS, Addl. PCCF cum CEO- CAMPA, and Guest of Honour Shri Rabi Kumar, IFS, CCF (Central), J&K. Shri Rai congratulated the participants and the organizers for making this training session successful and applauded its design which suited the requirements of the participants. He further added that since the ACFs & RFOs are at the cutting-edge positions, it was very important to have a thorough knowledge of the law and its implementation in the field. He said he was looking forward to more such UT specific courses in the future. He expressed his happiness over the discussion on the Forest Rights Act, 2006 that the field officers are now going to implement the same in the UT and a thorough knowledge of the Act would be essential for all the field officers.

Shri Rabi Kumar remarked that with the advent of technology it is now possible to train the officers to the new legal regime in the field of forestry and wildlife. He congratulated the organizers that despite the connectivity challenge, the participants could be imparted the best possible training and that all of them could complete it successfully. He exhorted the participants that now being alma-mater of the Academy, they may contact the academy and the resource persons without any hesitation for any further information. He also expressed his desire for further such courses specially designed for identified Master

Trainers from amongst the participants who could further train the frontline staff of the Union Territory. He appreciated the efforts of the organizers and the resource persons in making this programme successful. He also mentioned that UT of J&K would be looking forward to conducting more theme-based courses in collaboration with CASFOS, Dehradun

Shri Kunal Satyarthi, IFS, Principal, CASFOS, Dehradun, profusely thanked all the organizers, resource persons, and the participants to make this training programme very successful and that the Academy would always be at the forefront in conducting such programmes on contemporary issues frequently in coming future

The overall impact of the training has been very encouraging and positive. This is supported by the fact that the overall feedback score achieved for this training session was 90.84% which is on the higher side and corroborates the efforts taken by the organizers of the Academy and all the resource persons to make this programme a success!
